9:00 AM- Keynote: "She told a Good Story: A Tribute to Libby Sanders"-Jamin Bray, Shortleaf Interpreter Services, LLC, Resource Interpreter 10:00 AM- The Unseen of History, Caves and Ecology-Roxie Campbell, DNR Rock Bridge State Park Naturalist

History and natural resources that are unseen by park visitors are interpreted through aids such as a 1891 diary, oral history interviews, images, puppet shows and skits. See these methods and stories revealed through a PowerPoint and a puppet show. Topics interpreted range from a thriving industrial center, family farms and social life of the 1800's despite the lack of artifacts; the creation of the park through an unusual synergy of people of different backgrounds and goals; a large wild cave system that lies hidden underground and is closed to protect bats and invasive plants that either blend in or are absent.
